his year, the second quarter ended with the beginning of an exciting new journey: the Marine Corps will host DoD Warrior Games 2020 in San Antonio, Texas highlighting an exceptional military city and the strength and resilience of wounded warriors.

The Wounded Warrior Regiment (WWR) Warrior Athletic Reconditioning-Program, which supports and plans large-scale rehabilitative events such as the Warrior Games, is compiled of incredible professionals forever finding solutions that change people's lives. They cannot make that magic alone, though; WWR staff members from every section: operations, logistics, IT, strategic communications, all work tirelessly on each

event, large and small. Many of these events will be highlighted throughout this quarter's update.

Also this quarter, WWR leaders were asked to brief Tunisian officials and a French delegation on how we execute the Recovery Coordination Program. To the international community, the Marine Corps spectrum of support to Marines and families is worth emulating. These efforts may be less obvious to those on the outside, but WWR's team is forever improving the lives of recovering service members and their families through coordinated non-medical support. Their continuing recovery and success is our mission, and we remain ever faithful to them and the mission of the USMC.

395 Total / 205 New Cases

The Medical Section provides medical subject matter expertise, advocacy, and liaison to the military and civilian medical communities through a team of licensed clinical care advocates. The Medical Section reviews incoming cases to assess behavioral health needs, capture statistical information on diagnoses, and facilitate swift access to care. This quarter, the Medical Section supported 395 Marines, including 205 new cases

Recovery Care Coordinators (RCCs) work with Marines and Sailors and their families to develop and execute their comprehensive recovery plans. **This quarter, RCCs supported 991 Marines and Sailors, including 237 new cases.** RCCs are part of the Marine's or Sailor's recovery team, working closely with the command and medical team to optimize recovery.

The Sergeant Merlin German Wounded Warrior Call Center (WWCC) conducts outreach calls to WII Marines and veterans, and receives calls for assistance on a 24/7 basis. This quarter, the WWCC supported 4,833 Marines, Sailors, and families, including 210 new cases. This support is available to anyone, regardless of whether they were previously assigned to the WWR.

The two Wounded Warrior Battalion Contact Centers (WWBCC) conduct outreach calls to active duty Marines and Sailors who are recovering with their parent commands. This quarter, the WWBCCs supported 977 Marines, Sailors and families, including 192 new cases. The centers also offer support to commands and receive calls for assistance.

After more than three months without contract support, the WWCC and WWBCCs returned to full operating status April 24. Since that time, the reception from our wounded, ill and injured population has been phenomenal, and our staff members are rising to the challenge of ensuring each Marine and veteran receives the support they need. In July, the WWCC will begin to assist the Marine for Life Program in their support to the more than 35,000 Marines who transition to civilian life each year.

The Impact of WWR Outreach: On June 25th, non-medical case manager, Christopher Skidmore, conducted an annual outreach to a Veteran Marine. The Marine answered and immediately thanked him for reaching out, as he had recently been released from inpatient care for multiple mental health issues and was having a tough time. The Marine continued with his praise stating, "I am so grateful for your yearly call, especially this year. Every time you call me, the call center always follows through and is consistent. I really need that in my life as I move forward." This is a perfect example of "keeping faith" in action, increasing the resiliency of our population. This story is just one of hundreds that happen as we connect with our population. We are proud to support all Marines who wish to remain Etiam In Pugna.





499 Total / 131 New Cases

The Reserve Medical Entitlements Determination Section (RMED) manages all cases of Marine reservists in a medical hold status or a line of duty status. This quarter, RMED supported 499 Marines, including 131 new cases. As a Headquarters Marine Corps function, RMED processes initial applications and periodic certifications in support of Marine reservists around the world. Through a liaison at Marine Forces Reserve Command in New Orleans, WWR is able to ensure coordinated support for the unique needs of wounded, ill, and injured Marine reservists.

District Injured Support Coordinators (DISCs) are mobilized reserve Marines who provide assistance to Marines and Sailors recovering away from military bases, transitioning to veteran status, or medically retired to the Temporary Disability Retired List. **Field Support Representatives (FSRs)** are contracted support that function as DISCs. **This quarter, DISCs and FSRs supported 187 Marines, Sailors, and families, including 61 new cases.** DISCs and FSRs are geographically dispersed throughout the US to be able to reach a Marine or Sailor in need within 24 hours. They provide support for just one instance or over a period of time. Additionally, some DISCs currently serve the Wounded Warrior Call Center, providing critical 24/7 support by phone.

Keeping the Faith — Behind the scenes, DISCs and FSRs are geographically dispersed, working from home offices or Veteran Affairs centers, receiving phone calls every hour of the day and night—and these individuals are making a quiet and critical difference in the lives of veterans. Here is one highlight from this quarter:

Marine Veteran Receives Service Dog Franklin, Tennessee

In 2004, Corporal Rogers (pictured far left) served a second deployment to Iraq as a Reservist and infantry rifleman in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Rogers' unit fought in the Second Battle of Fallujah to clear the city of insurgents and reclaim it. In May, Rogers, who has been living with the aftermath of serving in one of the deadliest areas of Iraq, received a service dog through a recommendation written by WWR DISC Gunnery Sgt. Timothy Talbot and from Weekends with Warriors and Global K9.



The Cateran Yomp Scotland Highlands

From June 4-12, recovering service members, veterans, and WWR staff participated in a charity hike though the rugged terrain of the Cairngorm Mountains in Scotland. The Cateran Yomp is a 54 mile march, which the Marine team completed in approximately 24.5 hours. Hosted by the British Army, the Yomp challenges individuals to achieve personal distance goals while interacting with recovering service members from around the world. Regardless of age, disability, or circumstance, the focus is on creating resiliency and building relationships.

Human Engineering Research Lab (HERL) University of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania

Transitioning Marines were able to participate in the HERL Awareness Day, which introduced the process of appliance creating, product testing, seeking endorsement approval, and distributing products to users. The opportunities for education and internship include fields of engineering, kinesiology, and logistics. Each attendee created a titanium multipurpose tool with the United States Marine Corps emblem as a take-away.
