More than 250 wounded, ill, and injured Marines, veterans, and international athletes competed in the competition. International teams came from Australia, Colombia, France, Georgia, Germany, the Netherlands, New Zealand, and the United Kingdom. The Marine Corps Trials are a chance for these warriors to come together and focus on their abilities, not their disabilities.

Legislative Updates



WWR Command Advisor, Mr. Paul Williamson, testified before the House Armed Services Subcommittee on Personnel on the state of the WWR and future needs of wounded, ill, and injured Marines.

WWR Command Advisor presented briefs on the status and challenges of the WWR to the House Armed Services Committee professional staff and to the Senate Armed Services Committee staff along with other Manpower and Reserve Affairs (M&RA) leaders.

Pending Legislation



Provides fertility treatments, cryopreservation of gametes, and adoption support to severely wounded, ill, or injured service members and their partners (Introduced)



Directs the Sec VA to develop and publish a plan for improving the Vocational Rehabilitation program; including providing reasons why more veterans GI Bill benefits use is more prevalent (Introduced)



Directs the Sec VA to use authority granted under 38 U.S.C. Section 1701 to authorize non-department medical care to veterans more than 40 miles from a VA medical facility (Introduced)
